Pen & Wash Workshop Report

On Saturday 19th August 2017 eight GDAS members attended a pen and wash workshop for beginners and intermediates by Helen De Jonge. Starting at 10am Helen whet our appetites by sharing some of her wonderful artwork and explained



some of the techniques she likes to use.

As anyone who knows Helen would expect, she had prepared well ahead for the class. We were given a choice of either tracing or drawing blue wrens or magpies from Helen's previous pen and wash work – not surprising knowing Helen's love of depicting birds in her artwork! Most chose the blue wrens but some participants did both.

A demonstration followed on the use of ink pens to go over our traced work. Helen said this would take longer than painting and of course it did. Next we applied the water colour wash which was very exciting. Lunchtime came way too soon and I'm sure everyone, like me, was reluctant to put down brushes.

The afternoon brought more excitement our way as we attempted our second masterpiece. We traced copies of another of Helen's paintings, an interesting example of an old Aussie country house. Again we were guided through the same steps as in the morning. Another excellent demonstration was given by Helen who was at hand with her artistic wisdom and help when needed.

Finally everyone walked around and viewed each other's work. Plenty of compliments were given, photos were taken for the newsletter and unfortunately it was time to pack up.

Thank you Helen for generously sharing your knowledge and experience with us all. I'm certain this workshop has helped everyone to increase their artistic skills.

Parkin Drawing Prize worth \$20,000 awarded to a pile of carpet*- some GDAS members' comments

Can you draw with a blade or scissors? Yes, look at the Matisse cut outs. They have so much feeling.

The recent Art Express at our Goulburn Regional Gallery contained three portraits which were cut from paper and they were beautiful too. They were also 3 dimensional in that the glass, the papers and the backing had spaces between them. I am inclined to think though that the portraits were probably drawn with pencil first, then the drawn lines cut away. So the cut out lines have become a depiction of the drawing and not the drawing itself.

Lillico admits that is what he or she has done - re-represented someone else's drawing. But without having the original drawing to compare it to, it is impossible to say. However parts of it are obviously draped and folded, hung and laid down and I don't think that has anything to do with drawing.

The judge's comment about positive and negative should apply to any artwork and I can't see anything that relates to housing density or on affordability, etc. That's artist's pie in the sky talk to try to make something out of nothing.

Size has nothing to do with my opinion because I have seen murals that, although done in point, have been in a drawing style.

I would call the winning entry an installation, however I would add that I think the position in which it is hung is unfortunate because, as the picture shows, the architecture around it and outside completely takes away from the exhibit.
